While Rooted Life Montessori was born out of a desire to meet the needs of learning different children, the Montessori environment is also a vehicle for normally developing students, as well as gifted and talented children to, excel well beyond typical state standards.

"I had a 4-year-old essentially skip kindergarten academically, and a year later also skip first grade - all the while remaining in the same classroom with her peers," RLM Primary Lead Teacher Donna Shifflette said. "This is the beauty of the individualized curriculum, where I can guide each child to progress at his own pace."

There are other examples where primary or elementary students excel in one subject and are at normal levels or even behind in others, Machalica said. These students can be remediated and challenged

The Montessori classroom design and curriculum solves the problem of gifted and talented children feeling bored at school as well as learning different children being challenged at the right level.



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
